—and the power play that the issue involved—some of the premiers also expressed lively interest in launching a health insurance scheme. Here again there was no conclusion reached.

The subject was tossed to a committee and is to be discussed later at a meeting of health ministers. But the outlook for the scheme was none too bright. The costs would be heavy and some provinces as well as the federal administration questioned whether they can carry the load.

MAKE SOME PROGRESS

There was a little more headway on other fronts:

1. The premiers agreed to establish a permanent body of federal-provincial deputy finance ministers to provide a continuous economic link among the 11 governments. Each member would report back to his government. The committee would have no power to make recommendations as a body.

2. Mr. St. Laurent and Ontario Premier Frost got together for private talks and agreed to join in building the expensive northern Ontario leg of the all-Canadian gas pipeline if other parts of the 2,000-mile project can be financed by private enterprise.

3. The premiers agreed to have federal-provincial ministers meet later this year to consider ways of speeding up work on the Trans-Canada Highway and study other provincial proposals for public works.

4. The federal offer to pay half the costs of unemployment the splitting up of tax revenue jobs about to more than 45 of the population was discussed. Mr. St. Laurent said some provinces have initiated a draft agreement.

NOT ENOUGH MONEY

As the conference ended, the premiers issued a communiqué in which Mr. St. Laurent was empowered to call another conference after consulting with the provincial leaders.

The communiqué said Mr. St. Laurent did not put forward any definite tax proposals but elaborated on his suggestions for bringing the provinces back into the direct tax field as a replacement for the rental pacts which expire in March, 1957.

Premier Frost and Premier Douglas of Saskatchewan said they liked the germ of the federal suggestion—to allow the provinces to collect direct taxes again and give low-earning provinces equalization payments to bring their revenues up to the wealthier ones on a per capita basis.

But the big argument that most provinces made was the formula did not provide them with sufficient funds.
