

Iwo Kitimat construction workers were killed yesterday when a sudden slide hit their steam shovel at Mile 28 on the railway spur line between Kitimat

Dead are Kenneth George Sterling, 38, of Vancouver, where his wife lives, and Walter Mushumanski, 26, whose family lives at Grandview, Manitoba.

Few details of the tragedy were available today but RCMP' Prince Rupert said they understood that both men were employed by Campbell and Bennett, contractors building the railway spur for the Canadian National Railway, Sterling as a shovel operator and Mushumanski as an oller on the same machine.

The two reportedly were railway right-of-way at about Mile, 28 when a sudden slide shot off the hillside, engulfing them. No others were injured in the
