Diminutive Bob Kelsey got a free pass from Esquires' starter Jackie Sharpe, as did Darrell Young. Don Scherk singled to score Kelsey and Ralph Enridge doubled to score Young and Scherk.

That was all for Sharpe who was replaced by young Bill Donaldson.

After the first two innings it was a fairly even ball game.

Esquires played errorless ball for the remainder of the game and scored their only offering in the bottom of the third inning. Danny Bill singled and Barry Duncan brought him home with a single with two out.

SCHERK HOMERS

G & A added two more runs in the top of the sixth when Don Scherk hammered one of the longest homers of the season over the centre field fence. It was Scherk's first circuit blow this year and scored Sundberg who had doubled.

Ralph Enridge was the big artillery for the winners hitting a single and two doubles in four official trips to the plate. Bill Sundberg hit safely three times in five at bats.

Winning Dunbar held the clothiers down to four hits, al-

lowed one run, walked only one and struck out three.

Sharpe, the loser, in his 11th innnings got picked for seven runs, on four hits. He walked two and struck out two. Donaldson in 5 2/3 innnings, gave up two runs, five hits, struck out three and walked two.

## BLUE BOMBER DEFENSIVE END TOM LUMADEN DIES SUDDENLY

WINNIPEG Ⓛ—Tom Lumaden, 26-year-old defensive end with Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Western Interprovincial Football Union, died in hospital early today.

Lumaden was taken to hospital Thursday after suffering a gall bladder attack while driving with his family near Beaujardin, 30 miles east of here. Doctors ordered an immediate operation.

Lumaden joined Blue Bombers in 1951 after playing Junior football with Winnipeg Light Infantry.

The 235-pounder was considered one of the finest defensive ends in the WIFU.

He is survived by his widow and two children.

## Ex-Oriole Gene Woodling Helps Tribe to 9-2 Win

If Baltimore manager Paul Richards kept a record of the players he has traded away, he could call it "Poor Richards' Diary."

Richards, who doubles as general manager of the last-place Orioles in the American League, has paid off, among others, pitchers Bob Turley and Harry Byrd and outfielder Gene Woodling.

Woodling, traded to Cleveland last week really boomeranged, got four-for-four and batted in four runs as Indians trounced Orioles 9-2 Thursday.

Byrd, 30-year-old righthander bundled off to Chicago White Sox nine days ago, gave just four hits and blanked Washington Senators 7-0. It was his second victory in two starts since May 25, slipped one percentage point behind idle Milwaukee Braves, who trall Dodgers by 14 games.

And Turley, the young fireballer who went to New York Yankees in an 18-player deal that shipped Woodling and Byrd to Baltimore last winter, fanned

again, possibly Saturday, and it appears the straight will be heavy with swim traffic during the next few days.

Also here for a crack at the chilly, tide-ripped strait are two eastern Canada swimmers. Rev. John Donell of St. Peter's Roman Catholic church in Toronto and Janice White, 18-year-old daughter of a Toronto businessman, have announced they will attempt to swim the strait Monday.

They plan to start from separate points within 30 minutes of each other.

WENT ALMOST 20 MILES

Thursday's defeat was a bitter pill for Thomas, a former U.S. marine frogman. He swam nearly 20 miles on a zig-zag course before being pulled out and at one stage came within less than six miles of the Washington state shore before a strong wind and tides pushed him back.

He made an amazing swim the first four hours. He plowed through extremely dangerous tide rips between Race rocks and the southern tip of Vancouver island, 10 miles from here, being tossed about like a chip of wood by the whirlpools.

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## Portland Win Over Seattle Boosts San Diego's Lead

San Diego had more breathing space at the top of the Pacific Coast League Friday and the credit goes to Portland's Artie Wilson, an ex-Seattleite who turned on his former teammates.

Wilson scooted home with the winning run in the bottom of the ninth Thursday night as the Beavers shaded Seattle, 3-2, to even their series at a win apiece. Portland's victory snapped a Seattle winning streak at 10 straight and dropped the Rainiers 1 1/2 games behind the San Diego Padres, who beat Sacramento, 11-3.

Oakland broke a six-game losing streak by whipping Hollywood, 6-5, in a game featured by three home runs, and San Francisco clipped Los Angeles, 4-2.
