Slow Start On Roads

EVAN JONES, deputy minister of highways, at a Burns Lake Highway 16 conference, summarized the present position in B.C. as one of adequate money. for road building and an acute shortage of engineers. This situation, he said, was causing the 1956 road building program to run "in low gear." This contrasts with an optimistic statement by Hon. Philip Gaglardi last April in which the minister promised that the government would spend \$80,000,000 on B.C. roads this year.

Evidence in the field is that the season, now well advanced, will not see anything like so much money poured into the roads program. The department's problem has become a difficult one and is not eased by the long-established practice in B.C. of allowing much of the best building weather to pass each year before work gets started.



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
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
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
