### LABOR COUNCIL BRIEFS

## Three Major Subjects Slated in Course To Be Conducted Here October 26 to 28

The list of subjects to be taken by Prince Rupert Trades and Labor delegates at a labor educational course to be sponsored here October 26 to 28 by the educational department of the Canadian Labor Congress was cut from six to three at a TLC meeting at the Civic Centre last night.

The reduction was adopted on the advice of Max Swerdlow, chairman of the CLC's educational committee.

The TLC approved six of 13 subjects offered for the courses at its August meeting. However, after informing Mr. Swerdlow that an attendance of 25 could be expected, the TLC was advised to plan its classes for three subjects: Parliamentary procedure; Labor's role in the community and grievance procedure.

Other subjects the TLC had chosen were: effective union administration; labor journalism and economics.

In addition, the three-member committee of James Forman, John West and H. G. Bird was extended to include H. S. Harrison, Margaret Lowes, John Wyllie, Dennis Mulroney and E. A. Evans for handle arrangements for the course here.

Mrs. Horace G. Watts, president of the Diocesan Board of the Woman's Auxiliary of Caledonia left last night by train to attend Dominion meetings of the Anglican WA in eastern Canada.

Mrs. Watts will first attend the executive committee meeting of the Dominion Board of Anglican WA at Charlottetown, N.S., September 19 to 22. She will also attend the Dominion Board meeting at Halifax September 24 to 28.

On her way home Mrs. Watts, who expects to be away until the end of October, will stop off at Ottawa, Toronto, Kingston and Vancouver.

George M. Draneck, of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers Union informed the TLC that he hoped to be in Prince Rupert shortly to assist in a campaign to urge city clothing stores to sell only union-made clothing. Circulars outlining the "buy union" campaign will be sent to all clothing stores in the city.

A check will be made of the bills accrued from the Labor Day swim gala at McClymont Park and money forwarded to the TLC from various member unions turned over to Miss Rosaline Thain, organizer of the swimming events; it was decided.

A letter advising the TLC that the Workmen's Compensation Board travelling medical clinic would be in Prince Rupert September 28 was filed.

The TLC went on record as deplored the B. C. Hospital Insurance Service policy requiring a binding commitment on hospital operation costs which is hampering expansion plans at the Prince Rupert General Hospital. Under the policy if actual expenditure exceeds estimated expenditure or revenue is less than anticipated, hospitals must compensate by reducing expenses or finding other sources of revenue.

Credentials of T. V. Tattersall, a delegate of the International Union of Operating Engineers were approved.
