## Toronto Stocks Hit Seven All-Time Highs

The industrial index at the Toronto stock exchange this week rolled to one of the biggest gains in years as it went up more than 13 points.  
During the last three sessions of the week, the index hit seven all-time highs and finally closed at 486.42. Last week's close was 473.00. The industrials' solid advance pulled the rest of the stock market to a moderate gain, too.

The whole economic picture in Canada is encouraging and firms' annual reports have improved. The stock market reflected the resulting optimism.  
Another factor which probably helped industrials this week was the report of the trade department that Canada is planning enormous economic expansion. The survey showed businessmen, institutions, governments and individuals are planning to spend \$2,000,000,000 for new buildings, houses, equipment and machinery this year.  
The Gettysburg announcement Tuesday that U.S. President Eisenhower had decided to seek re-election had been expected for four weeks and caused only a ruffle in the markets.

Trading at Toronto quickened during the week as 20,704,000 shares were exchanged. Last week only 14,335,000 were traded. Of 877 issues traded, 351 advanced, 337 declined and 189 remained unchanged.  
Aluminum was a big winner with a 9 1/2-point gain to 143 1/2. Algoma Steel added six points at 121. Howard Smith was also up two points. Ford A gained 5 1/2 points.

On the losing side, Loblaw B lost 10 1/2 points and Confederation Life nine.  
Hudson Bay made the best gain among senior base metals, climbing 4 1/2 points to 91.  
Canadian Devonian won 80 cents among western oils with Canadian Atlantic Oil up 70 cents.

## Spectre of Steel Strike Behind Optimistic Reports

NEW YORK (AP)—Government and business reports this week showed there are more people with jobs in the United States than ever before. There are more and higher pay cheques and merchants are busy ringing up bigger sales on their cash registers.  
It made good reading for the businessman and the job-holder who shares in the country's prosperity. But lurking behind each report was the spectre of the two-week-old steel strike dragging against the business advance.

Commerce Secretary Sinclair Weeks said Thursday he is "more optimistic" about economic prospects than he was a month ago—provided the steel strike doesn't last too long.  
He said his earlier forecast of an easing in business during the third quarter would have turned out to be "only a ripple" had there been no strike.  
Thus far the shutdown has made 650,000 steelworkers idle and 100,000 others were reported laid off in related fields, mainly transportation and mining operations connected with steel.

As the strike goes on, layoffs will increase. This means a sizeable loss of buying power. The strike eventually will be felt by makers of all kinds of consumer items, from clothing to autos.  
The commerce and labor departments reported 66,500,000 people had jobs in June, despite layoffs in the auto industry which are calculated around 200,000.

## Good Salmon Catches Being Made

VANCOUVER (AP)—Fishermen are continuing to reap good harvests of sockeye salmon in the Rivers and Smith Inlet areas off the B.C. coast.  
In Rivers Inlet, 700 boats are averaging about 70 sockeye a day while 400 boats in Smith Inlet have reported average catches of between 80 and 100 a day.  
In the Wales Channel, in northern B.C. waters, a rich pink run has developed and 15 seiners reported catches averaging 630 pinks.  
Boats in the Nass River are taking 60 to 80 sockeye a day, but catches remain light in the southern coastal region.

## 45 New Policies Taken on Boats By Fishermen

VANCOUVER—Additional salmon gillnet boats worth \$250,000.00 were brought under the protection of the Fishermen's Indemnity plan at Rivers and Smith Inlet in the past two weeks.  
According to Blake A. Campbell, area administrator of the plan for the Department of Fisheries, a total of 45 new policies and 15 renewals were completed by district appraisers P. N. McLeod of Prince Rupert and G. R. Morgan of Vancouver in a busy tour of the fishing grounds on fisheries patrol launch "Brama," specially assigned for the trip.  
The "Brama" was dispatched in response to a continued keen interest in the low cost government coverage for small vessels, about 1,000 of which are now concentrated in the sockeye fishery at the two northern inlets.  
Mr. Campbell, who was on the scene for part of the time, said more and more fishermen are taking advantage of the dual tier coverage now provided by most commercial marine underwriters.


## RELIQS OF REPTILE


