## Scenery vs. Industry

A LTHOUGH an order-in-council has now officially marked off the flooded area of Tweedsmuir Park as a storage basin for Alcan, it is doubtful that this controversial case will be closed so readily.

One organization still protesting the manner in Which flooding was carried out is the Tweedsmuir Bark Rod and Gun Club. In a recent letter to Minister of Lands R. E. Sommers it said:

"The fate of Tweedsmuir Park will remain a live issue. Instead of a great lovely continuing asset, we have here an appalling horror, a vast festering sore in the heart of our province. Without extenuation, a monument for decades to come of futility and greed, a veritable graveyard."

The Club is disturbed not only by the destruction of scenery but by what it regards as a mortal hazard. Recalling that last March five men were drowned when their boat struck an underwater snagin Stave Lake near Mission, which also was dammed for power purposes, the Club added:

"In the coming years many people will venture out on the waters of these lakes. Sudden storms will arise and boats will be wind driven and impaled on snags and debris and many will be drowned. Already there have been a number of near tragedies, and the situation will worsen."

While it is understandable that those who have for Greater Victoria's water supa close personal attachment to this magnificent park are appalled at the effect of the flooding, there is hard realism in the view expressed by the Victoria Daily Times that what has happened is "now literally water behind the dam."

"British Columbia, in this instance, bartered scenery and recreation area potential of high value for the great commercial asset of an aluminum industry," the paper says.

"Few people suggest that the price was too high for the industrial development it purchased. Many, on the other hand, believe that the flooding of the lakeland was carried out without adequate preparation. They think that foresight before the water was raised could have produced something a great deal better than lake margins of drowned trees."

As one group expressing the latter opinion, the Tweedsmuir Park Rod and Gun Club should at least receive attention for future reference. The government parks experts who had recommendations along the same line, during negotiation of the Alcan deal were given little voice in the final outcome. There all professional advice is to be MEAL VOUCHERS was, and is, no legislation which could make their arguments count.

If Mr. Sommers and the rest of the cabinet are wise, they will look upon the Tweedsmuir Park group's letter as a reminder of this. When industrial and scenic interests conflict, there should be greater assurance that a fair compromise will be reached.


