CAREER SPORTS TO BE DROPPED FROM GAMES IF PLEDGE FAILS

CHICAGO (AP)—The president of the International Olympic Committee has warned that if the IOC's new anti-professional Olympic pledge is ineffective, sterner measures may follow.

Avery Brundage of Chicago, who issued a lengthy statement Sunday backing up the pledge, said sports which persist in serving as a springboard into professional ranks may be dropped from the Olympic schedule.

The pledge, which caught United States Olympic officials and athletes by surprise, requires each contestant to swear on his honor he will remain an amateur after the 1956 Games at Australia.

Brundage's statement emphasized that the thousands of persons throughout the world who help finance, as well as those who conduct the Olympics without financial reward, are entitled to be guaranteed that the Games will not serve as a stepping stone to pro contracts for any athletes.

Russians Favored For Soccer Debut

MONTREAL (CP)—The highly-rated Moscow Lokomotiv soccer team goes on display before Canadian fans tonight in the first game of its exhibition tour of Canada.

The Russians, who have been playing exhibition matches in several countries, are strong favorites to wallop a Quebec all-star squad which will oppose them in tonight's game at the Montreal Baseball Stadium.

Conrad Leber, a member of the executive of the Canadian Football Association, said advance ticket sales point to a capacity crowd of some 20,000. He said 12,000 tickets already have been sold.

Coach Boris Arkadyev has been running his Lokomotiv team through stiff workouts since arriving here. The squad also has attended a Canadian football exhibition game and an International League baseball game—neither of which impressed the soccer players.

WALK OUT OF GAME

The Russians found there were too many breaks in the action in an exhibition game between Montreal, Alouettes of the Big Four and Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Western Interprovincial Football Union. And Sunday they walked out after watching only seven innings of the first game of a baseball doubleheader between Montreal Royals and Richmond Virginians.

The Russians' next exhibition game is scheduled for Winnipeg Wednesday. They will also play in Toronto, Vancouver, Calgary and other Canadian cities.

Lessons Pay Off At All-American

CHICAGO (AP)—E. J. (Dutch) Harrison, who won his first pro tourney almost 20 years ago, today aimed at golf's richest plum with a rejuvenated putting game and the \$3,420 all-American top swag stuffed in his pocket.

As the oldest champion ever to win Tam O'Shanter's all-American meet—a trick he turned Sunday with a 10-under-par total of 278—the 46-year-old Harrison may be geared to make a successful stab at the whopping \$50,000 first money in Tam's "world" meeting starting Thursday.

Harrison, who began an illustrious play-for-pay career by winning the 1937 Arkansas Open, now leaves his teaching trade at the Old Watson Country Club in St. Louis only for the big tourneys.

TAKES LESSONS

A most affable, if not too frequent prospector in golf's perennial gold rush, Harrison gave his younger rivals a lesson in the all-American after he, himself, had taken some on-the-scene putting lessons at the halfway mark.

"You're never too old to learn," said Dutch. "I knew my putting needed to be sharpened after a 72 and a 71. So George Lowe, an old pro from Sarasota, spent two hours with me on the practice greens and gave me an aluminum mallet putter."

"I used that baby on the last two rounds and the results tell the story—I shot a 68 and a closing 67 and for the last 36 holes had 15 one-putt greens."

Second place money of \$2,360 went to Earl Stewart of Dallas, who was the 54-hole leader but took a windup 71 for a 72-hole count of 280.

Third was lame-armed Ed Furgol, the 1954 U.S. Open champion, whose 231 won him \$2,000. Jim Ferrier took fourth with 282, worth \$1,700, while two strokes back, Jack Burke Jr. and Stan Leonard of Vancouver and Lachute, Que., shared fifth with 284, collecting \$1,375 each.

At Balduin of Toronto finished with a one-over-par 289, posting a 74 in the last round. He had previous rounds of 73, 72 and 70.

The other Canadian in the tournament, Gerry Kesselring of Kitchener, Ont., blew to an 80 Sunday to raise his total to 304 after posting earlier scores of 76, 69 and 79.



Yank Losses Set Scene For Pennant Race In AL

The New York Yankee nose dive has reached the stage where Boston Red Sox can turn the American League "walk-over" into a pennant race in a series opening tonight at Fenway Park.

Despite six straight defeats in Cleveland and Detroit, the Yanks still lead Cleveland by seven games but Boston closed ground with leaps and bounds during the weekend. Only 1 1/2 back of the Indians and 8 1/2 behind the Yanks, the Red Sox are riding a modest five-game winning streak.

Cleveland blew its chance to tighten the race after taking three out of four from New York. Three straight defeats by Boston cost the Tribe an opportunity to get the Yanks within striking distance.

The Milwaukee - Brooklyn struggle in the National continues with the Braves and Dodgers each winning doubleheaders Sunday. The Braves remain two full games in front of the Brooks with each team gaining a game on Cincinnati, led by rain at Philadelphia.

Despite Mickey Mantle's 37th home run, the Yanks bowed to Detroit 8-5 in a game that was delayed 87 minutes by rain with just one out to go in the ninth inning.

Ted Williams' 12th homer off Bob Lemon gave Boston its 2-1 edge over Cleveland after Jackie Jensen's homer tied the score. The game was cut short by a torrential rain storm in the eighth that forced postponement of the second game.

Baltimore slugged Chicago twice, 5-4 in 10 innings on a neat relief job by Billy Loes and 7-2 for Ray Moore on the strength of a five-run rally in the seventh.

Clint Courtney and Pete Runnels did the heavy hitting in Washington's 10-4 romp over Kansas City for a series sweep. Ed Mathews hit two home
