IBADAN, Nigeria (AP) — The Queen's restrained grooming has jolted Nigeria's Mayfair, where dusky beauties parade in king-size gold ornaments and apply their face powder with a ladle. The royal visit has touched off a spate of lectures in fashion columns of the Nigerian press. "All of us who are particular about fashion will have something to copy from the Queen," said a woman writer in the Ibadan Tribune. "Let us watch the style and suitability of her dress." "Let us see how nicely she does her hair and applies makeup." "Adora" of the Lagos Times was more blunt. "How would a distinguished African woman, not even a queen, have landed at Ikeja Airport?" she asked. "I'll dare tell you. On every other finger there would be at least two gold rings. Around the neck would be rows and rows of gold beads. To crown all there would be a long gold chain almost touching the knees. That is not all. On the blouse there would be two large brooches, each tying with the other for place. On the ears would be large earrings practically tearing the ears down. Around the wrists there also would be one or two gold bracelets. In fact, the only spot that would escape this extremism would be the teeth."

TORONTO (CP) — More than 40 outfits fashioned by Canadian designers from domestic-made fabrics were paraded Tuesday night at the Canadian Association of Couturiers' national spring-summer fashion premier.

For evening and even casual wear, the 17 designers represented showed considerable interest in back effects.

In a white ball gown, France Davies drew attention to the back with flowing panels patterned with bright red flowers. Olivia of Hamilton used a large gold bow in back to emphasize a billowing skirt. Casual dresses featured deeply-scooped necklines in back.

Bright solid shades were the favored colors while cottons, acetate, nylon and viscose led the fabric parade.
