THE COST OF DISCIPLESHIP

"If any man would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me."

IODE Chapters To Observe Anniversary With Founder's Day Tea This Monday

The Prince Rupert Chapters of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire will observe the 56th anniversary of the foundation of the organization with a "Founder's Day" tea Monday at the home of Mrs. H. W. Steel,

514 Third Avenue West. Proceeds will go into the convention fund. If we are going to be followers of Jesus, we are going to have a cross to bear. What is the cross? It is anything and everything that we hear because we are disciples of Christ. The IODE is the largest voluntary patriotic women's organization in Canada and spends nearly \$1,000,000 annually on its projects. The IODE was organized by Mrs. Clark Murray in Montreal in 1900. It is non-political and non-sectarian and open to all women who

With more than 2,000 members in 900 chapters the IODE

is Canadian citizens or British subjects.

The aims of the IODE are to

foster a bond of union among

women and children of the British Commonwealth; to care for the widows, orphans and dependents of servicemen; to provide prompt action in times of emergency and to preserve the memory of the deeds of Canada's war dead and preserve soldier's graves.

This year, 13 post-graduate scholarships (overseas) of \$2,000 each and 20 bursaries to the value of \$1,600 each in Canadian universities is being provided from the First and Second World War Memorial Funds. The scholarships represent only a portion of the \$240,000 assistance given to Canadian students and schools, providing books, educational supplies and monetary aid for fees, transportation and hotel lunches.

Thousands of knitted and sewn articles of clothing and quilts are distributed in Canada, Great Britain, Europe and Korea.

The local Queen Mary Chap-

ter, Duchess of Edinburgh, Cambridgeshire and Municipal Chapter of the IODE take an active part in all projects.
