Replace Sweets With Fruit Famous Nutritionist Urges

TORONTO — Nutritionist Dr. Elizabeth Chant Robertson says sweets in the diet are a waste of money.

"They spoil the appetite for the food our body requires, increase tooth decay and are completely lacking in vitamins," she told a parent-teacher association. She recommended attractive fruits instead.

Dr. Robertson exploded a popular myth that vitamin content

of citrus fruits is destroyed if it is allowed to stand for some time before using.

If juices are stored in the refrigerator the vitamin content remains relatively unchanged up to three days, she said.

Outlining diet suitable for children and adults alike, she said good sources of vitamin C are cabbage and other members of the cabbage family, either raw or properly cooked, field-grown tomatoes, and new potatoes cooked in their skins.

Vitamin A, found in the yellow orange and green vegetables, is also essential.

She stressed the importance of both adults and children of adequate milk and cheese for calcium and vitamin B2. Adults should retain a habit of drinking at least 16 ounces of milk a day, she said, or at least eating some cheese.

Eggs should be eaten often and vitamin D, derived from fish oil, is a necessary part of the diet especially in winter.


