## Dodgers One Point Ahead of Milwaukee

St. Louis Cardinals, who hooked up with Brooklyn in those stirring pennant battles of the 1940s, have taken a page from the past to leave the Dodgers with a skinny one-percentage-point edge in the National League race today.

The Cardinals, 13½ games back in fourth place, knocked off the Dodgers 6-5 Tuesday night on Ken Boyer's ninth-inning home run while second-place Milwaukee was rallying to defeat Pittsburgh 6-4.

Cincinnati virtually was out of the race after losing a two-night doubleheader to Philadelphia 4-3 and 7-4. New York Giants split a pair with Chicago Cubs, winning 8-2 after a 4-2 defeat.

MANTLE CLINCHES FLAG  
Mickey Mantle's 50th home run wrapped up the Yankees' seventh pennant in eight seasons. It came in the 11th inning to defeat and eliminate Chicago White Sox 3-2 while giving the Yankees a tie which their league record of 182 home runs set in 1936.

Cleveland reclaimed second place from Chicago with a 1-0 and 6-0 sweep against Washington. Kansas City edged Boston 6-5 and Detroit defeated Baltimore 6-2.

The Cardinals, who beat Brooklyn in the first major league pennant playoff in 1946, blew a 4-0 lead before riding in on Boyer's two-out, two-run homer. Gil Hodges' two-run homer in the seventh seemingly had given the Brooks a fourth straight victory.

Johnny Logan's two-run single in the eighth won for the Braves who blew a 3-0 lead when the Pirates chased Lew Burdette in the sixth. Lou Slaughter won in relief, but manager Fred Haney called in Warren Spahn—who won in nine innings the night before at New York—for the final two outs.

SIMMONS, ROBERTS WIN  
Curt Simmons stopped the Redlegs in the opener, despite Gus Bell's 30th and 31st homers. Robin Roberts, winning his 18th, then handed Cincinnati a fourth straight loss. Ed Bailey's 27th home run locked in three Redlegs runs. Larry Jansen and Art Fowler were the losers.

Bob Rush four-hit the Giants for his 13th victory in the first game, but Jackie Brandt drove in five runs to beat the Cubs in the nightcap.

Mantle, whose two-out shot made him the eighth major leaguer ever to hit 50 home runs in one season, broke up Billy Pierce's bid for a 21st victory. Whitey Ford won his 19th, with relief help. Walt Dropp and Larry Doby homered for the Sox.

## Trailermen Sure Of 2nd-Game Victory

TORONTO (CP)—The Mann Cup series goes into its second game tonight with Nanaimo Timbermen one game in the lead, but without a clear playing edge over Peterborough Trailermen.

The Trailermen took the first game of the best-of-seven senior lacrosse championship 15-13, but slumped so badly in the final period that many observers still give Petes a good chance to go all the way.

Playing-coach Ike Hildebrand and his Trailermen blamed the cement floor at Maple Leaf Gardens for their inept play in the first three quarters, in which Nanaimo built up a 13-7 lead.

Peterborough, which plays its home games outdoors, found the cement floor imparts a much sharper bounce to the ball than an earth or wooden playing surface. In addition, the play of Moon Wootton, all-star netminder, was far below par for much of the game.

In the last quarter the Trailermen slugged in six goals to Nanaimo's one before the Timbermen put it on ice with a goal from the stick of ex-Peterborough forward Don Ashbee.

OVER-CONFIDENCE CURED  
Tonight, believing they have the feel of the floor and having lost any over-confidence they may have had, Trailermen feel certain they can square the series.

The Sunday defeat had added sting in that another former Peterborough star—21-year-old Bobby Allan—did most of the damage with five goals.

Hildebrand, on the sidelines with a hip injury suffered in a playoff game with Hamilton, probably will be back in action tonight.

Timbermen coach Harry Wipser, another ex-Trailerman, insisted his team's victory, though

considered an upset by others, was just what he expected, and figures they'll take tonight's game. The third game will be played Friday.
