Reds To Visit Canadian Farms

WASHINGTON — A Soviet embassy official said this week the Soviet farm delegation now visiting the United States plans to fly to Ottawa from New York Aug. 25 to begin a two-week tour of Canadian farm land. Details of the tour are being arranged by Vladimir Matskevich, acting Soviet minister of agriculture who heads the 12-man delegation. It is presumed the tour will begin with a visit to the Dominion experimental farm at Ottawa.

Critics Praise Shapiro Novel

NEW YORK — Canadian novelist Lionel Shapiro's new novel, "The Sixth of June," has won praise from New York literary critics for its portrait of wartime London.

The critics, however, were divided as to their opinion of the book as a whole.

Lewis Gannett of the Herald Tribune writes "The Sixth of June" is a "good war novel and a moving love story." Charlie Poore of The Times says it is "a wonderfully true picture of life in Second World War London" faced "with an uncommonly pure three-cornered love affair."

And Time Magazine says there is less reason for "The Sixth of June" to be remembered than remained.

Teeners Sane; World Crazy Says Doctor

ANN ARBOR, Mich. — Teenagers are not crazy mixed-up kids—but the world they live in is.

So says a University of Michigan child psychiatrist.

Dr. Ralph D. Rabinovitch says:

"With all his problems, the adolescent has priceless assets which, given the proper nurture, far outweigh the negatives but some things continually get in his way."

Dr. Rabinovitch says many parents, in trying to give their child independence, go too far and deprive them of needed family security and guidance.


As a result, he says, they are forced to stand on legs too wobbly to hold them.

"In some families," he says, "it is as though parents no longer dare direct a child after he has reached the magic age of 16 . . . It is certainly nice to grow up with one's children, but it is also wise to be more mature than one's children."

Adolescents, he says, need more than a school course in the physiology of sexual functions. He says:

"The primary elements of sex education are found in family relations. In feeling tones between parents and in feelings between parents and child."

When To Lead Trumps Not An Easy Problem

I have a charming letter from a reader in San Francisco which reads, in part:

"Dear Mr. Blackwood:

I guess you could call me Mrs. New. I am just learning to play bridge. I enjoy your column and I especially like Mrs. Fusty. Without hesitation she makes plays that take me half an hour to figure out. Why don't you write some columns for people like me? For instance, the question of when to lead trumps, as declarer, is always a dreadful problem for me. Couldn't you give us a simple, clear-cut answer to that question?"

DEEP WATER

Thanks, Mrs. N., and I must say that you have hit on a subject that runs into some pretty deep water. However, I will be glad to go along with you. We will start with a very simple hand and see where it leads us.

The basic consideration is this: do dummy's trumps have a

more important job to do than merely following suit to trump leads from the closed hand? That is, will dummy's trumps be more valuable if used to ruff declarer's losers or to stop one of the opponents' suits while declarer is setting up a side suit of his own?

In today's deal Mr. Abel led the king of clubs and dummy had no short suits and therefore no ruffing power. There was no reason to delay the leading of trumps and Mr. Masters properly laid down the ace and king of hearts. If he put this off until later, the defenders might have been able to use their trumps to ruff in.

When the queen and jack of hearts dropped, Mr. Masters led a third heart to dummy's ten. Miss Brash discarding a small diamond. He came to his hand with the king of diamonds and noted Mr. Abel's discard of a small spade.

MASTERS PUZZLED

Next he cashed the ace of spades and followed with a small spade. On the second spade Mr. Abel played the ten. This puzzled Mr. Masters for a moment. Mr. Abel had overcalled in the suit and it looked like he should have the king.

However, if he did have it the odds were that he would have played it on this trick. Mr. Masters made the right guess and ducked in dummy. Miss Brash had to play her now singleton king and five-odd rolled home.


