

VANCOUVER (CP)—Representatives of 32,000 workers Thursday broke off the 1955 contract negotiations with coast lumber and logging operators.

City Hall, Banks Be Closed Easter Monday

City Hall will be closed all Easter Monday. Mayor George Hills announced today, the move is in keeping with closure of all government offices and city banks for the holiday.

Postmaster Jack Burgess however said that the post office will remain open part of the day for sale of stamps and money orders. The office box lobby will be open from 7:30 a.m. until 6 p.m. and tickets will be open from 8 until 12 noon.

Meanwhile, in Victoria, deputy labor minister William Sands said a full conciliation procedure will be put into motion as soon as an application is received.

Construction In City Up Over Last Year

Construction in Prince Rupert for the first three months of this year is \$80,000 greater than for the first quarter of 1954, a check of building figures at City Hall shows.

So far this year, building permits valued at \$168,032 have been issued, compared to \$88,020 for the same period last year.

Permits for construction valued at \$81,137 were taken out last month, a sharp increase from the \$7,325 taken out in February. Last year, in March

permits valued at \$50,160 were taken out.

Additions and renovations to three commercial enterprises and four new dwellings make up the bulk of the construction covered by permits issued last month. Increased refrigeration and storage facilities at the Royal Fish Company is valued at \$18,000 while additions at Ideal Cleaners are valued at \$10,000. The Taylor alterations at the Broadway Cafe are valued at \$5,000.

Four new homes in the city are being built at a combined value of \$20,000.

Value of permits issued each month this year, with last year's figures in brackets are as follows:

January \$80,970 (\$1,850); February \$7,326 (\$14,020); March \$81,137 (\$50,160).

It recommends laws governing:

Importation of vessels for coastwise trade; registration of vessels in coastwise grade; registry of vessels carrying Canadian goods, and subsidized or otherwise assistance to shipbuilders and shipping.

CCF Party In Ontario Ousts 14 As Communist Group Members

Men Paying Dues To Trotsky Setup

TORONTO (CP)—Fourteen persons have been ousted from the Ontario CCF party on the grounds they are members of a Communist organization.

Cancellation of the CCF memberships of the 14 was approved Friday by delegates attending the 21st annual convention of the Ontario CCF.

The party's provincial council charged that those expelled were members of the Canadian section of the Fourth (Trotskyist) International, "in effect another political party with aims quite contrary to the CCF."

Such membership automatically cancels membership in the CCF, the council ruled, and its action was confirmed at a four-hour closed meeting.

Details were issued later by CCF provincial leader Donald C. MacDonald, provincial president Eamon Park and provincial secretary Ken Bryden.

GIVE CASE HISTORY

Copies of a 2,000-word report detailing the history of the investigation and proceedings against the 14 were presented to delegates.

The report said the Trotskyist party, "in spite of its many differences with Stalinist communism, is nevertheless a Communist party with a revolutionary and authoritarian philosophy which is quite incompatible with the democratic and parliamentary socialism of the CCF."

Leon Trotsky was one of the leaders of the Russian revolution and was expelled from the Comintern party in 1927. He eventually found his way to Mexico City where he was assassinated in 1940.

The report said the Canadian section of the Fourth International exists with dues-paying membership and with its members under strict discipline.

Members were under the instruction to join the CCF with the objective of using the CCF for Trotskyist purposes.

Mr. Bryden in an interview identified nine as Jim and Kit Mitchell of the Davenport riding; Harry and Pat Payne of East York; Bruce Battie of High Park; Gerry Houle of Rosedale; Paddy Stanton and Ken Sutherland of St. Paul's and Moyer Shapro of Greenwood, all in the Toronto metropolitan area.

NINE APPEARED

He said four others were from the Toronto area and two from Windsor. He declined to identify them.

Delegates were also given copies of a letter written by Colin Cameron, CCP Member of Parliament for Nanaimo, B.C., asking careful consideration before Mr. Stanton was expelled.

Mr. Cameron said he had been asked by Mr. Stanton to write on his behalf. He said that Mr. Stanton could be "a most useful ally."
