Win Keeps Brooklyn On Heels of Braves

Baseball has had some wonderful moments. Like when Ted Williams returned from the wars. Or when a "washed up" Johnny Mize tagged home runs for the 1950 Yankees.

Now it's Sal Maglie, the guy the Giants had enough of; the old man Cleveland couldn't squeeze into its second-place pitching staff.

Sal, the one-time Dodgers killer, beat Milwaukee in Brooklyn's over-night share of the National League lead two weeks ago.

And Tuesday night it was Maglie again, using his curve and control to gain his first no-hit, no-run game with a 5-0 masterpiece against Philadelphia. The win kept the Dodgers within three percentage points of the first-place Braves.

OLDEST TO DO TRICK

At 39 Maglie is the oldest National Leaguer ever to pitch a no-hitter, and, ironically, it overshadowed a splendid, six-single job by Warren Spahn, another comeback guy, that gave Milwaukee a 7-1 victory over Cincinnati and all but shut the door on Redleg pennant hopes.

It was the 20th victory for the 35-year-old southpaw, prematurely tagged as a has-been last season.

CARDS CLINCH FOURTH

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GOLFER MARLENE STEWART NEGLECTED

U.S. Sports Writers Ignore Canadian Champs

NEW YORK (AP)—At least one Canadian resident of this city went through the week of the United States women's amateur golf tournament with a growing feeling of annoyance as Marlene Stewart moved steadily onward and upward to the title.

Her progress was briefly noted in the smallest type in the largest newspapers while the fortunes of the Pat Lessers and Wiffi Smiths were discussed in detail. And when the Lessers and Smiths disappeared, the stories concentrated on the fabulous crop of teenagers and golfing grandmas who had ousted them.

MAGEE ALSO IGNORED

A couple of weeks earlier it had been the same story as Toronto's Jerry Magee reached the semi-finals in the men's amateur. But there had been some excuse in the case of Jerry, whose reputation was largely made in Canada.

The same can't be said of Marlene. At 22, the Fonthill, Ont., girl has won all the important tournaments and has beaten virtually every ranking American amateur on both sides of the border and abroad.

Before the U.S. amateur, the magazines were full of pictures of golfers, some extremely photogenic and all undoubtedly talented who were considered the best bets of the tournament. No sign of Marlene.

Only when she knocked off the last two teenagers and won the title did the writers make the belated discovery that the unheralded champion hasn't lost a

tournament this season. Then, the day after the tournament ended, one writer overheard Marlene turn to the last surviving teenager and tell her, "you're the greatest."

The writer proceeded to agree with Marlene's handsome tribute at some length. Eight paragraphs later, almost as an afterthought, he said the new champion "likely will be seen in U.S. tournaments for a good many years to come."

Now it is entirely possible that the teenager in question may become "the greatest" before very long. But the book says that tribute belonged to somebody else last Saturday.

And we can't help feeling that the girl who wins the big championship is entitled to at least 24 hours' worth of glory.

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
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
