B.C. NEWS ROUNDUP

Vancouver Forest District Closed for Second Time

VICTORIA (CP)—A closure on Vancouver Forest District was ordered by the Lands and Forests Department Monday.

The order—second this summer—followed an emergency conference between chief forester Dr. C. D. Orchard and other government officials with representatives of the Forests protection service.

The decision was made after the officials conferred by telephone with district forester D. B. Taylor in Vancouver concerning the mounting fire hazard due to continued hot weather.

The closure forbids all recreational travel in the forests and limits industrial operations.

VANCOUVER (CP)—"Do not feed the bears," the sign read. But it didn't say anything about a bottle of ale on a hot day.

The question of whether or not playground signs at the approaches of McGearymont park were placed too far from the entrance to the park was left under the jurisdiction of the Parks Board, after Mayor George E. Hills reminded aldermen that park commissioners were "very reticuous" of the problem of
