## AT THE BALL PARK

Last night a committee dealt with the protest filed by Cliff Dahl on Sunday's game between the Hotelmen and Gordon & Anderson and after considerable discussion, decided to overrule the protest and award the game to Gordon & Anderson.

The protest was based upon Rule 1:09 which states as follows:

"First, second and third bases shall be white canvas bags 15 inches square, not less than three or more than five inches in thickness, filled with soft material, securely attached to the ground in positions as shown in Diagram 2."

You will recall that Nick Pavlikis ran from first to third on a ball hit by Don Hawryluk. After Nick had reached third base safely and Don had made second base, young Billy Smith called for the ball from Darrell Young and tagged the bag and then appealed to base umpire, Steve Mintenko. Mintenko then called Pavlikis out for failing to touch second base. A big rhubarb then resulted over the fact that the second sack was not secured to the ground as set down in the above rule and the result was that Dahl notified Umpire-in-Chief Dido Gurvich that the game was to be played under protest. The reason the bag was not fastened was that when the field was dragged that morning, the spike and wire was pulled from the ground and not replaced as the grounds keepers were not too sure of the exact location.

There is not a specific rule laid down to cover a situation such as this so the committee was obliged to throw out the protest on Rule 3:12 (4) which states as follows:

"The manager of the home team shall be the sole judge as to whether a game shall not be started because of unsuitable weather conditions or the unfit condition of the playing field, except for the second game of a doubleheader."

Gordon & Anderson have now clinched a first place tie and a win for them tonight will give them the league championship if they can get past the resurgent Esquires who gave them plenty of trouble the last time they played.

In a way it was a tough break for the Hotelmen but when you recall the game itself, G & A's victory was decisive enough although it is hard to say what might have happened had Mintenko ruled Pavlikis safe. However I think that the bases have to be touched and if you can't call a man out then it is pretty hard to be able to call him safe.
