

FIRST SHIPMENT of British pipe for Westcoast Transmission line from the Peace River to Vancouver, is now enroute to Vancouver. This photo shows the S. S. Germa taking on 1,300 tons of 30-inch diameter pipe at the Port of Middlesbrough, England. The pipe is the product of South Durham Steel and Iron Co. Ltd. This company will supply 75,000 tons. It will be used in the construction of about 200 miles of the 650-mile line. The Germa sailed January 12 and is due in Vancouver February 13. The pipe will then be distributed to various points between the Fraser Valley and the Peace River block, ready for early construction in the spring. Canadian Bechtel Limited is agent for Westcoast.
