



West Smashes Through East Defence In Grand 35-0 Football Season Finale

VANCOUVER — The cream of Eastern Canada's professional football prowess turned stale and its highly-touted aerial offensive fizzled abruptly on Empire Stadium's rain-soaked gridiron Saturday before the might and courage of the Western all-stars.

In the grand finale to this year's Canadian football season, the West routed the East 35-0 in the second annual Shrine all-star contest.

And it was a hard, tough football game played there in the bitter cold of a driving wind, icy rain and a temperature of 35 above. Pools of water lay in mid-field. The field was greasy and slippery and the end zones were covered with snow. A diving tackle would carry a player another five yards after he hit the turf. Players were soaked from head to toe, and chilled to the bone. "I've never been so cold in my life," said Etchevery after the game.

Winnipeg's Bob McNamara and Saskatchewan's Ken Carpenter who shared punting duties with Larry Isbell, were other standouts for the West.

Offensively, Hamilton's Cam Fraser was easily the most valuable to the East with his long-range punting. Fraser averaged 41.3 yards on 15 punts to help hold off the charging West.

Fliers, Regals Tie Lead, Canucks Trounce Seattle

After 20 minutes of play at Winnipeg Saturday night, Edmonton Flyers appeared headed for a tumble into second place in the Western Hockey League's prairie division.

Then they snapped out of it, scoring four straight goals while holding Winnipeg Warriors scoreless, to overcome a 3-0 deficit and register a 4-3 overtime victory that kept them abreast of Brandon Regals.

The Regals, tied for top spot while Flyers, downed New Westminster Royals 5-3 in the British Columbia city, behind the winning goal at 0:20 and Chorney shot his second five minutes later.

Phil Maloney led the Vancouver scoring attack at Seattle with two goals, his fifth and sixth in two nights. He scored four Friday against Brandon.

Bill Wyle rapped in Vancouver's other goal while Guyle Fielder scored for Seattle. Steve Wittek, Archie Scott, Sandy Iweal and Milan Marcetta were the Stampeders' marksmen at Calgary. Doug Macenuly scored for Cougars.
