Remember the dance Friday night. We'll be seeing you there.




WITH SALAD TIME coming up, don't forget that tarragon basil or thyme, can give even the simplest salad the "ambrosia" touch.

EVERY HOUSEWIFE appreciates any hints which help to keep her summer housework down to a minimum—so here are a few summer laundry tips which do just that:

FABRICS WITH NEW, non-tarnish metallic yarns (often coated with protective film) may go into your washer. Use a mild soap, the water temperature recommended for fabric in which yarn is used, and short wash time. Metallic-printed fabrics are best hand-washed in warm water.

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water with mild soap or light-duty synthetic detergent.

EMBOSSED OR GLAZED finishes on cottons, (seersucker, chintz) are machine washable.

To be sure, check garment hang tag. Wash in warm water and soap or synthetic detergent for three minutes, rinse, spin-dry.

Avoid unnecessary crushing and abrasion, chlorine bleach. Dry embossed fabrics in dryer on high heat. Skip ironing—it flattens design.

BLUE JEANS AND OVERALLS

may need special treatment to clean them of heavy soil. Pre-soak or pre-wash in hot water 10 to 15 minutes, using extra amount all-purpose soap of synthetic detergent. Wash in hot water with about ½ to 1 cup borax and regular amount detergent. Dry jeans in dryer or on drying form to eliminate pressing.

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
