### New To Greeks

THE Greeks never had a word for it, but it is because of them that ice hockey is a factor in international relations. Throughout all the Olympic Games, winter and summer, there is no one event that arouses more patriotic fervor than this particular sport. A country will puff with pride when its contestant wins in some event where the individual superiority of the contestant is all that counts, but it puffs alone. The occasion has come and gone almost before anyone realizes what has happened, and the drama of the following events quickly erases it from everything but the record books.

In the slower process of the hockey eliminations, however, there is a chance to take sides. Moreover the teams are looked upon as more representative of their countries than the single contestants in other events.

It is for this reason that the hockey contest now underway is considerably more than just another item on the Olympic program. It is a form of mock warfare in which men of different nations are bashing into and outmanoeuvering each other. It is a head-on test of good or illwill, with spectators stepping up the provocation.

Naturally a country with a strong team like Canada will have more stake in the proceedings than most of the others but the contest has broad interest all the same, particularly since Russia is in the same category. As the issue finally narrows down to the two strongest, the countries that have been eliminated will show their support for one or the other with almost the same vigor as if they themselves were still in the fight.

So far the Canadians seem well on the way to winning an international following, to say nothing of the series itself. But the outcome to be desired most is that, whoever wins, the good sportsmanship of the whole show will be what everyone remembers. The world stands to gain by it.






