ommers Satisfied With Road Answers Queries Of Brown, Calder

VICTORIA (C P) Mines Minister Sommers said Friday he is satisfied with construction of the 350-mile Cassiar - Stewart road in northern B.C.--except for some work at the start of the project in 1947.

The issue was raised by Bruce! Brown (L-Prince Rupert) who placed a number of questions onthe house order paper dealing? with the project, and also by Frank Calder (CCF-Allin).

In his answer tabled in the house, Mr. Sommers said the road has cost the government: \$1,517,917 since 1947. The largest share of \$569,299 went to the construction firm of Wade and Wells Ltd., one of four companies involved.


