

Sergeant and Mrs. Ross A. Clayton Dined at RCMP Regimental Dinner

They here tonight, aboard the ship George bound for a port in the Okanagan are Sergeant and Mrs. Ross A. Clayton and their three children, sons Phil and Larry, and daughter Betty, a popular officer, who has been sergeant in the RCMP sub-division for two years, is retiring in two weeks and plans to take a leave in Kelowna.

Mrs. Clayton were Tuesday night at a full dinner at the Broadway Cafe at 8 o'clock.

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Highlighting the event were presentations of a beautifully inscribed silver tray to the couple and a gift of jewelry to Mrs. Clayton, by Inspector W. M. Taylor, officer commanding of the sub-division.

Sgt. H. L. Norman, NCO in charge of the Prince Rupert city detachment, was master of ceremonies for the event, paying tribute to Sgt. Clayton for his long service with the force. Mrs. Clayton also was presented with a lovely corsage by Mrs. Jack Wiegierinck. Const. D. D. Klatt proposed the toast to the Queen.

Sgt. Clayton, born in Grand Valley, Ontario, joined the force in December, 1931, in Regina. Early in 1932 he transferred to Vancouver to complete his training and to serve for some time with the mounted troop. In May, 1934, he moved to Penticton and then served in Merritt, Vernon and Cranbrook prior to coming

to Prince Rupert in 1952. Last fall, Sgt. Clayton, along with Inspector Taylor, received RCMP long service and good conduct medals.

The sergeant will be missed too, for his activities with Prince Rupert's Pony League of which he was president during this past season. Mrs. Clayton for the past year has been publicly convener for the local chapter of the Registered Nurses' Association.

Following the dinner the Claytons were further honored at an informal reception at HMCS Chatham. A highlight of that event was presentation of a shield to Cpl. A. E. Fox of Hazelton detachment, who won the title of best shot of the sub-division when he scored 199 out of a possible 200 in the annual revolver shoot. It was the first presentation of the shield, offered by Inspector Taylor for annual competition.

Schapiro on Radio Tonight





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
