Queen Mother, Princess Margaret Display Lively Interest in Big 12 Fashion Show

LONDON (Reuters) — Queen Mother Elizabeth delighted London fashion models last week by showing a lively interest in

items they were wearing at a show by the capital's "Big 12" designers.

The Queen Mother, walking around the long drawing room of a stately home here, was accompanied by Princess Margaret, who also asked many questions of the mannequins.

At one point, the Queen Mother paused to finger a cocktail dress and a long coat in pink, white and scarlet patterned cotton and exclaimed to the models, "The colors are wonderful."

The show was held in the home of Viscountess Camrose, Carlton House Terrace, under the auspices of the Incorporated Society of London Fashion Designers. All the items shown were made especially for the royal show, a departure from custom. All the items also were made of British materials.

SUIT OF BRITISH VELVET

One model wore an exact replica of a suit worn by Lady Olivier actress Vivien Leigh. It was a chic black number in British velvet, with black tulles replacing the velvet in the back of the jacket.

The Queen Mother herself wore a blue and green printed silk dress with matching blue velvet beret switched with a fold of green velvet, and deep-toe pumps. Her jewels were three large loops of pearls and a jew-

eled clasp with a large amethyst in the centre.

The show was tantamount to a preview of spring fashions.

The Queen Mother carefully questioned each question as he took his place beside her while his own models were exhibited. Princess Margaret also visited frequently with the designers.

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
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
