## Saturday Sermon

First Baptist Church

God gave Israel certain ceremonies which commemorate great events in God's dealings with them. The time came when Israel departed from God and forgot the significance of these ceremonies.

The people, however, kept on observing them which became mere ritual having lost its original meaning. God's attitude toward keeping up the form when the real meaning is no longer there, is indicated in Isaiah 1: 13 and 14: "Bring no more vain oblations; incense is an abomination unto Me; The new moons and sabbaths, the calling of assemblies, I cannot away with; it isiquity, even the solemn meeting. Your new moons and your appointed feasts My soul hateth: They are trouble unto Me; I am weary to bear them."

Something very similar has happened to our observance of Christmas. Not long ago a professor of psychology in an American university instructed his class of 40 students to write the word "Christmas."

"Now," said the professor, "write after the word 'Christmas' the first thought that flashes through your mind." When the papers were handed in, such answers were given as "presents," "tree," "turkey," "Santa Claus," "liquor," but not one had written "the birthday of Jesus Christ."

I wonder what God thinks of keeping Christmas without the community singing during the first part of the program event that ever took place in human history? The Christmas story is not a Hebrew myth. It is not Christian folklore. It is a blessed and glorious fact. God has actually come down to earth, and has become incarnate in the person of the Man, Jesus Christ. This great event was predicted 700 years before it took place, in "Isaiah 7:14": "Therefore the Lord Himself shall give you a sign: Behold a virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." Immanuel means "God with us." This can only mean that when Jesus was born in Bethlehem Deity came to earth and took upon Himself a human body and nature. When we were born that was the beginning of our existence, not so in the case of the one who was born in the stable at Bethlehem. The Bible teaches that the Lord Jesus took to Himself a human nature in every respect like ours except one. He was free from sin. The fact that Christ was both Deity and human is in-
