DOCTOR SPEAKS TO CLUB

Watch on Mental Health Of Children Great Need

"We do not need an ambulance at the foot of the cliff but some fences at the top," Dr. J. H. Smith, director for Skeena Health Units, Tuesday night told the Business and Professional Women's club at its regular dinner meeting held in Club 27.

In his subject, "The Changing Face of Medicine" Dr. Smith said that the great need is to watch over the mental health of the school child. While 90 per cent of children enrolled in schools have an average IQ, five out of 100 of these children will go to mental hospitals, he said.

Dr. Smith said that he felt the school and home were the key points for laying the foundation in mental health. Psychology should be practiced in the school and the home. It is not an obscure science but simple common sense, he said.

Discipline is the most essential factor and prepares the child for the world, Dr. Smith said. "It is not fair to the child in the home or school to allow him free expression."

He said that pure water, pure milk and pure food are today taken for granted with specialized people daily carrying out routine jobs that keep the world's people free from plagues and diseases. Polio and tuberculosis are now gradually being brought under control.

Today emphasis is being lifted from disease and placed on health and with more positive thinking "we speak of mental health more frequently than of mental disease," the medical health officer said.

As alcoholism has the aspect of a mental disease, more light should be thrown on the damage and dangers of uncontrolled alcoholism and education is the best source of prevention, Dr. Smith said.

Mrs. Roy Boychuk was appointed a councillor for the chapter.

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
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
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
