Adult badminton representatives will be Mr. and Mrs. Robert Tough matched in a best-of-three series which will get evening's activities underway at 8 p.m.


Tug o' war, under direction of Art Murray who is emcee for the evening, will be held at half time in the men's basketball game.

## One-in-Lifetime Shot by 'Peg Skip Gives Manitoba 15th Curling Title

MONCTON, N.B. (CP)—Billy Walsh curled a curve and won the Canadian curling championship for Manitoba Friday night, snatching a sensational 8-7 extra-end victory off Ontario.

It was one of the most stirring finishes in the Canadian classic, and the 3,200 fans packed in Moncton Stadium rose to their feet in salute to the poker-faced Walsh.

Walsh, a scholarly-looking gent who captured the crown once before, broke up an Ontario two-house with a shot that curled around guards and hit the blue.

"It's a good shot," he said. "Never made a shot like it." The 39-year-old skip from the Winnipeg Fort Rouge Club.

FIRST IN 27 YEARS

Art Corriveau of Montreal, director of the 11-rink tournament that draws the best from across the country including two from Ontario—Northern Ontario and Ontario—summed up the championship-winning shot this way:

"You'll never see one better." It was the first extra-end playoff in the 27-year history of the championship and the 15th time Manitoba has won the title. Altogether, the west has taken the crown 22 times.

Not since 1939 when Bert Hall skippered his Kitchener-Galties to the title has Ontario come so close to capturing the Macdonald's Brier Trophy.
