MANUFACTURERS OF VACCINE TO REVISE SAFETY STANDARDS

WASHINGTON & -- The United States Surgeon-General announced today all Salk polio vaccine manufacturers have agreed to implement at once revised safety standards. The standards represented "the best that science can give us."

Dr. Leonard Scheele's statement consirmed earlier word by the six participating pharmaceutical firms as they left a meeting with U.S. public health service scientists.

Acceptance by the manufacturers of the new government standards for making and testing the vaccine cleared the way for manufacture of new supplies.

The surgeon-general also indicated reclearance was on the way for supplies made by Pltman-Moore, Zionsville, Ind., and Wyeth, Inc., Marietta, Pa. Those plants were inspected some time ago.

Scheele aid his advisory committee had told him "there no question about the ability of these two manufacturers to produce an execlient vaccine."

Dr. Johas E. Salk, developer of the vaccine, commented "the pirture is most hopeful."

The program in Canada has continued without interruption, with supplies produced by the Connaught Laboratories in Toron o being double-checked by the federal health department in Ottawa before release. More than 750,000 Canadian

children have received their first shots.
