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Girl Dies In Leap From Plane **Eights Efforts** To Halt Jump

SAN RAFAEL, Calif. (AP) — A pretty college graduate plunged 1,000 feet from a rented plane Monday, leaving a fragment of her sweater grasped in the pilot's hànd.'"

"It was presumed Flora Anderson, 22, University of California graduate last June, fell to her death near Stinson Beach.

The pilot, Stanley Gordon, 28. an insurance underwriter, was questioned extensively and released. Police said "it would definitely appear to be a sui-
