

BROOKLINE, Mass. (A) - Here and there:

The old Barber, Sal Maglie, won his first start as a Yankee with a three-hit shutout, which was to be expected. Few players, old, young or in between, have failed to come through for the New Yorkers after being acquired for the stretch run, even if they were apparently living their baseball lives on borrowed time.

Some have stuck around after proving their worth, Johnny Mize was one. Johnny Sain another. The venerable Enos Slaughter is still going strong.

It was ironic that Maglie's shutout should have been hurled against Cleveland Indians, the club that let him go to Brooklyn Dodgers last year for a little pocket money.

The critics of the Yankees scoff at the idea, but there is something about those pin-stripe uniforms that brings out the best in players they acquire. Maybe being with a winner has something to do with it, though. A whist of world series money is a stout tonic, and even if Maglie isn't eligible to pitch in the classic this year, he will be well taken care of by his teammates, and probably the club, if he continues to pitch winning baseball.

Ray Robinson still is the underdog in his middleweight title defence against Carmen Basilio at Yankee Stadium September 23. This is nothing new to the sugar kid, who has been picked to lose in most of his recent bouts.

We can't quite figure his underdog role this time. The only thing he will be giving away is years and we still think Robinson has a lot in his favor.

One of his chief advantages will be about eight pounds in weight. We don't remember him ever losing to a man lighter than himself. He's been tough enough for those who outweighed him up to about 15 pounds.

The pattern of the fight seems to be obvious. Robinson is the better boxer and probably the stiffer puncher. He'll try to stay away and take advantage of these assets. Basilio will figure that at Robinson's age, body punches will be the most debilitating. He'll try to stay in close and wham away wating for Sugar to melt.
