Considers Appeal

Rupert Firm May Argue PUC Move

Neal Evans Transportation is considering an appeal against the Public Utilities Commission ruling, rejecting the city firm's bid for a daily bus service between Prince Rupert and Kitimat.

The PUC refused Neal Evans Transportation a licence to run a once-daily each way bus serv ice between the two centres and granted Canadian National Transportation Ltd., two licences and Kitimat Transportation a licence for a bus service all between Terrace and Kitimat.

Reason given for rejecting the city company's application was "due to insufficient trade and social intercourse between Prince Rupert and Kitimat."

The PUC also approved rate applications for the bus services between Terrace and Kitimat of \$1.45 one way and \$2.60 return for the Canadian National Transportation Co. and \$2.50 one way and \$4.50 return for the Kitimat Transportation Co.

In addition, Farwest Transportation Limited of Vancouver and Kitimat, which formerly operated a service between Kitimat harbor and the city centre, was given permission to run an airline limousine service between Kitimat and Terrace airport.

The Kitimat Transportation Company was given permission to run regular buses once a day to Terrace and to operate a chartered bus service out of Kiti-The firm's service must start on or before March 1.
