City Council last night reaffirmed its confidence in Works Superintendent C. J. Gustafson by passing, for a second time, a motion on "city hiring" that was vetoed by Mayor Peter J. Lester at the March 10 council meeting.

The motion, moved by Alderman T. Norton Youngs on March 10 and passed by the majority of council, stated that hiring of men for public works jobs be done by the superintendent of works rather than through the Unemployment Insurance Commission.

The mayor exercised his veto at the last meeting under Section 178 of the Municipal Act, which gives a mayor or reeve the right to veto a motion and refer it to the next regular meeting for consideration.
