## Ship Reflects Dignity Of Cheerful Skipper

A sleek new type of bulk cargo freighter glided into its berth alongside the Canadian Government elevator piers early Tuesday afternoon under the command of a man who has been sailing around the world for 35 years, Captain Berge Andrassen.

This new modern vessel, the MV Estello of Norwegian registry, reflects the pleasant personality and refined dignity of Thursday, the night before her captain, who supervised its sailing.

Rich oak paneling contrasted by gay drapery and slip covers in bright colored patterns gave the atmosphere a feeling of cheerful relaxation.

## B.C. Man Leaves Fisheries For Assignment With FAO

T. H. Butler of Nanaimo, B.C., has been granted a year's leave of absence by the Fisheries Research Board of Canada to take up an assignment in Indonesia on behalf of the Food and Agriculture Organization, (FAO), Rome, Italy.

Speaking at the Rome headquarters of FAO before leaving for Jakarta, Mr. Butler said: "My work will include advising and assisting the Government of Indonesia in planning and carrying out a survey to try to find new shrimp grounds in Indonesian waters.

"This is to some extent in line with the work I have been doing at the Biological Station at Nanaimo, where we made exploratory surveys to find new shrimp grounds. We located several and at least two of them have since come into commercial production, one near Prince Rupert and the other along the east coast of Vancouver Island."

Mr. Butler was also engaged on population studies of shrimps and crabs, investigating the fluctuations in abundance, and carrying out similar work. The object was to determine the possibility of setting up a management policy to control B.C. crustacean resources.

Mr. Butler was born at Nelson, B.C., and went to school in the Okanagan Valley and in Vancouver. Later he studied at


