WELLINGTON, N.Z. (CP)—A team of New Zealand polar explorers led ry consultant. by Sir Edmund Hillary reached the South Pole today after a 1,300-mile overland haul by dog teams and tractors across the Antarctic continent.

The tractor party arrived at the pole with only one drum of gasoline to spare, but came out "bang on base," Hillary reported in a radio message. "We are all very tired but we

are very pleased to have arrived. Success could not have been possible without the help we had from everyone from the time the expedition was first planned. My thanks go in particular to every member of the expedition whose support in Antarctica put where we are now."

Hillary, conqueror of Mount Everest, thus became the first, man to reach the pole by the overland route since Capt. Robert Scott's ill-fated expedition in

Scott reached the pole Jan. 12 of that year with four companions, only to find that Roald Amundsen of Norway had about a month earlier become the first depots and find a route for a man to reach the bottom of the British party crossing from the Pater and December 21.

# Arrives Firm Winds Up 48-Year Service

Due in here for the last time tonight to wind up 48 years of passenger service will be a Union Steamships vessel from Masset.

The ship, a converted corvette from the Second World War is the Chilcotin, destined on the last day of the passenger service, to take on 14 persons from this

E. A. Enwright, agent here for Union Steamships, said by the time the Chilcotin reaches Vancouver she will have "about a half load."

The Union Steamships Ltd., announced December 18 that the subsidized passenger service was being withdrawn January 3 because of increased losses.

Other Union Steamship vessels which will not be calling here on the regular passenger service will be the Camosun, Coquitlam both former corvettes. About the best known Union Steamship boats here were the vessels Catala and Carderia which called regularly at Prince

Rupert between 1925 and 1946. Among the Chilcotin's passengers tonight will be Mrs. John Kasper, 1015 Second Avenue West who is taking a boat trip south for a two-week visit to Vancouver. Usually an air traveller, Mrs. Kasper is taking the voyage for old times sake. In earlier days she used the Union Steamships extensively when she lived at Stewart.
