



NEW DELHI (2) — Prime Minister Nehru is being sued on | we'll tell you what to do," Sias teen-agers dropped their guns a complaint of causing mental agony to a fellow politician by comparing a cow and a horse.

Nehru's opponent in the last general election, Pandit Sitaram Khemka, said the provocation came in a speech by the prime minister February 6 at Allahabad. Nehru, says the complaint, remarked he saw no difference between the cow and the herse, both being equally dear and useful to human

Khemka, a learned and orthodox Hindu Brahmin — Nehru, too, is a Prahmin — protested that the cow is the most sacred animal for the Hindus and to compare it with the horse is a

In a complaint filed before an Allahabad magistrate, Khemka said "Mr. Nehru has injured my religious feelings and has caused me mental agony."

He asked 109,000 rupees (\$21,000) damages, but said he would be content with one rupee (21 cents) since "Mr. Nehru claims he has not saved a pie." A pie is worth one fifth of a cent. No date for a hearing has been fixed.




