"As most members are aware, the highways department are presently engaged in the construction of a road from Killmat to Terrace in the Skeena constituency—a project which we hope will be completed either this year or early in 1958. Such a road will give Killmat a road connection with Highway 16, enabling traffic between Killmat and Prince Rupert.

"No reconstruction work whatsoever has been done at the Prince Rupert end by this administration, nor has an inch of pavement been laid.

"In view of the fact that this comparatively short stretch of road will service the needs of industry and some 35,000 people in the area, I respectfully urge the minister to call for tenders on the reconstruction of Highway 16 beginning at the Prince Rupert terminus east, bringing this road up to the provincial high standards of curves and grades.

Such a road, when surfaced, will facilitate travel between Prince Rupert, Terrace and Killmat, and will do much to bolster the economy of these respective communities.

"It is presently contemplated that Highway 16 from Prince Rupert to Shames (the present terminus of bitulthic surface) will be provided with a dust-free surface during 1957. I closely questioned the minister on this point and, while he would not commit the department to a hot-mix program over the entire route, he definitely committed himself to a bitulthic surface on the unpaved sections and a continuation of the paving program.

"The road from the west end of the Terrace bridge will be relocated along the opposite bank of the Skeena, with a bridge to connect with the existing highway at Kitselas.

"This relocation will bypass the tortuous road that exists near Copper River and elsewhere within the bypassed area. The relocation survey has been completed and work will be undertaken this year.

"Reconstruction of the highway from Kitwanga to Skeena Crossing and the uncompleted portions between Smithers and

Hazelton will likewise receive attention in 1957.

"It is expected that the Killmat-Terrace highway will be completed this year or early 1958. The minister is particularly anxious that this link be completed as early as possible, and there should be a considerable concentration of equipment in that area this year.

"The road from Masset to Port Clements will be completed this year and funds to accomplish this vital link are already in the estimates of expenditure for the department.

The McClymont Park bridge will be constructed in 1957 and engineers have informed me that every effort has been made to make the design conform to the aesthetic properties of the park, commensurate with structural requirements.

"A complete survey will be made and alternative routes studied to avoid the dangerous corner at the junction of Frederick Street with Eleventh Avenue, with a view to either modifying the present grade and sharp corner or making a new approach."

"Distribution of ashes" will also be made following the "Stations of the Cross" at 3 p.m. and at the 7:30 evening mass.

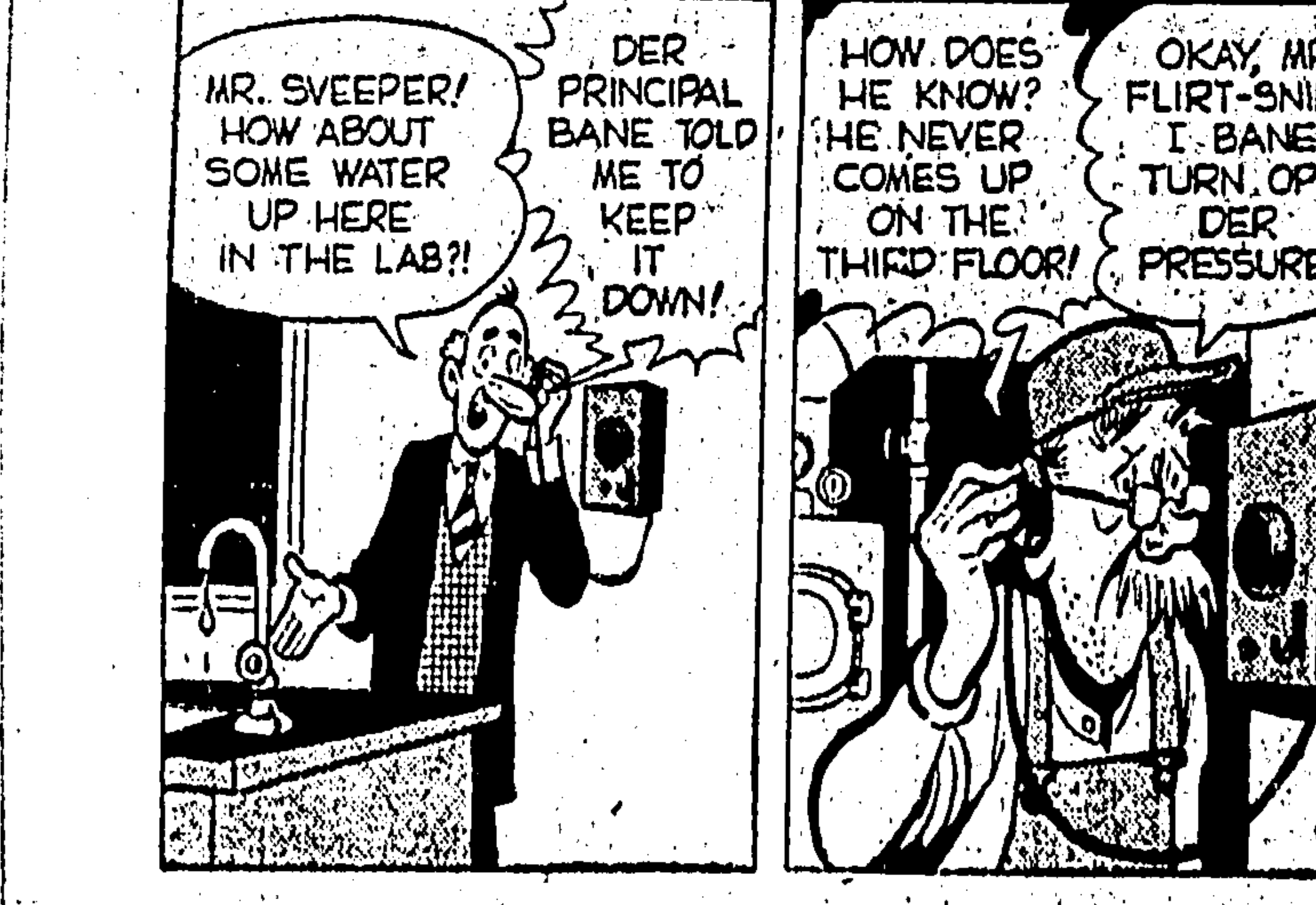
Lenten devotions will also include "Stations of the Cross" every Friday at 7:30 p.m., Father McMahon said.

VESSEL REQUIRED FOR CHARTER
The Fisheries Research Board of Canada will charter a vessel with crew for a 70-day cruise during the spring of 1957. The vessel will be required to operate in waters off the coasts of British Columbia, Washington or Alaska. The charter will be for about 70 days, commencing on April 1 or soon after.

In addition to a captain and crew, accommodation must be available for two men from the Fisheries Research Board. The crew will be required to assist at times in handling specimens.

The vessel must be capable of remaining at sea for periods of up to a week and should be equipped with reliable radio-telephone and adequate instruments for navigation on the high seas.

The charter payments to the owner are to cover rental of the vessel, payment of personnel and all operating maintenance costs, except fuel and lubricating oil which will be supplied by the Board.

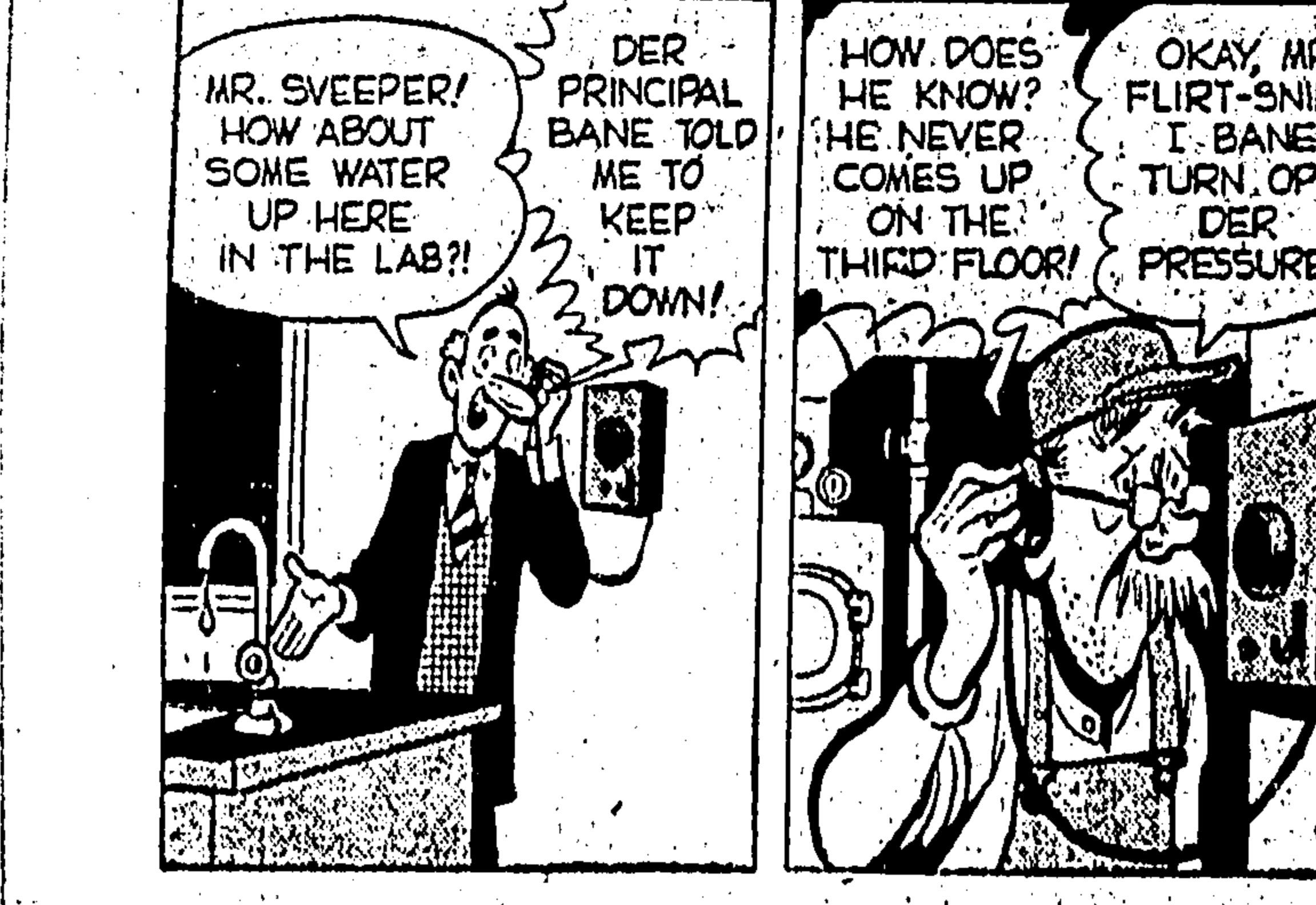

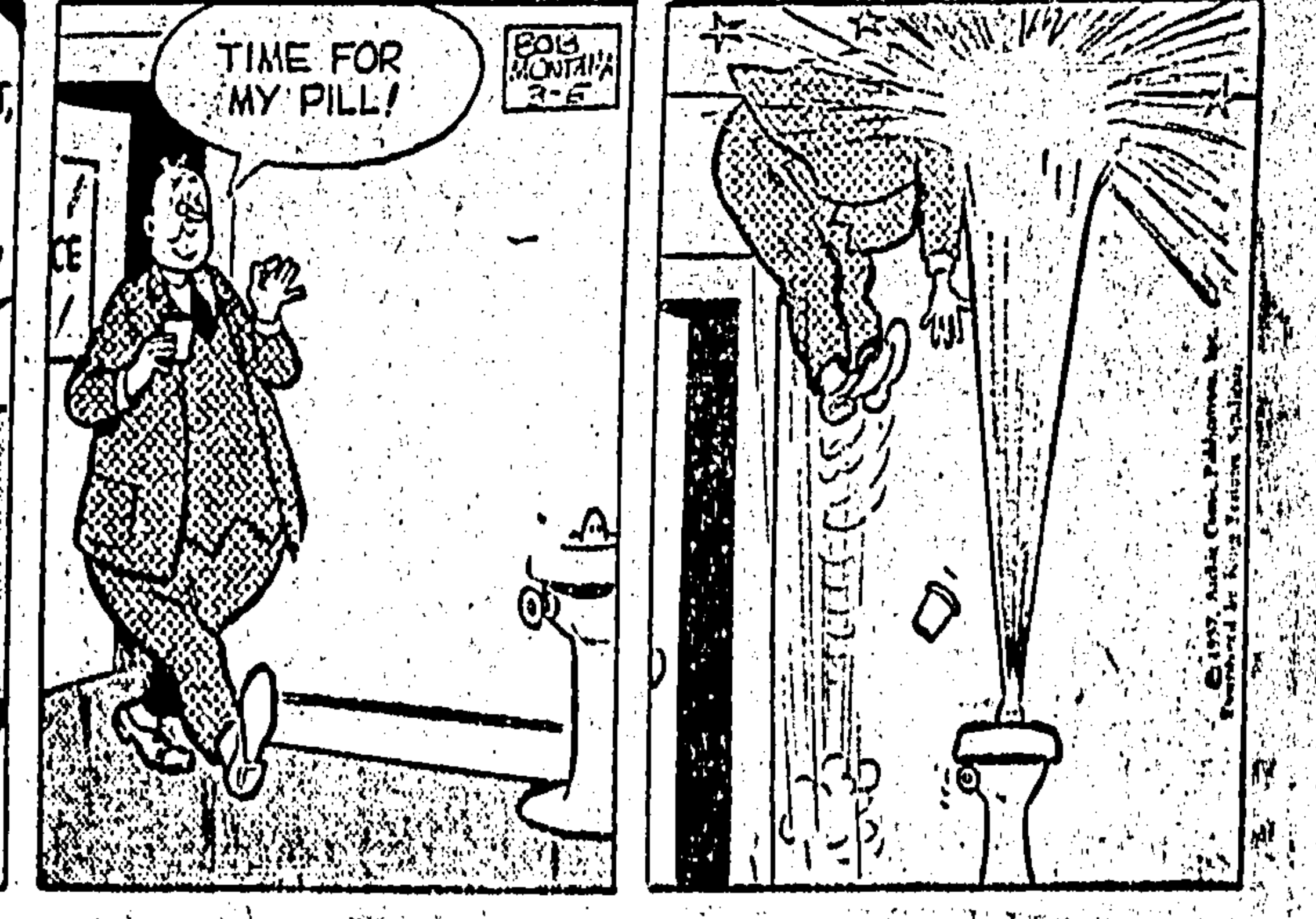

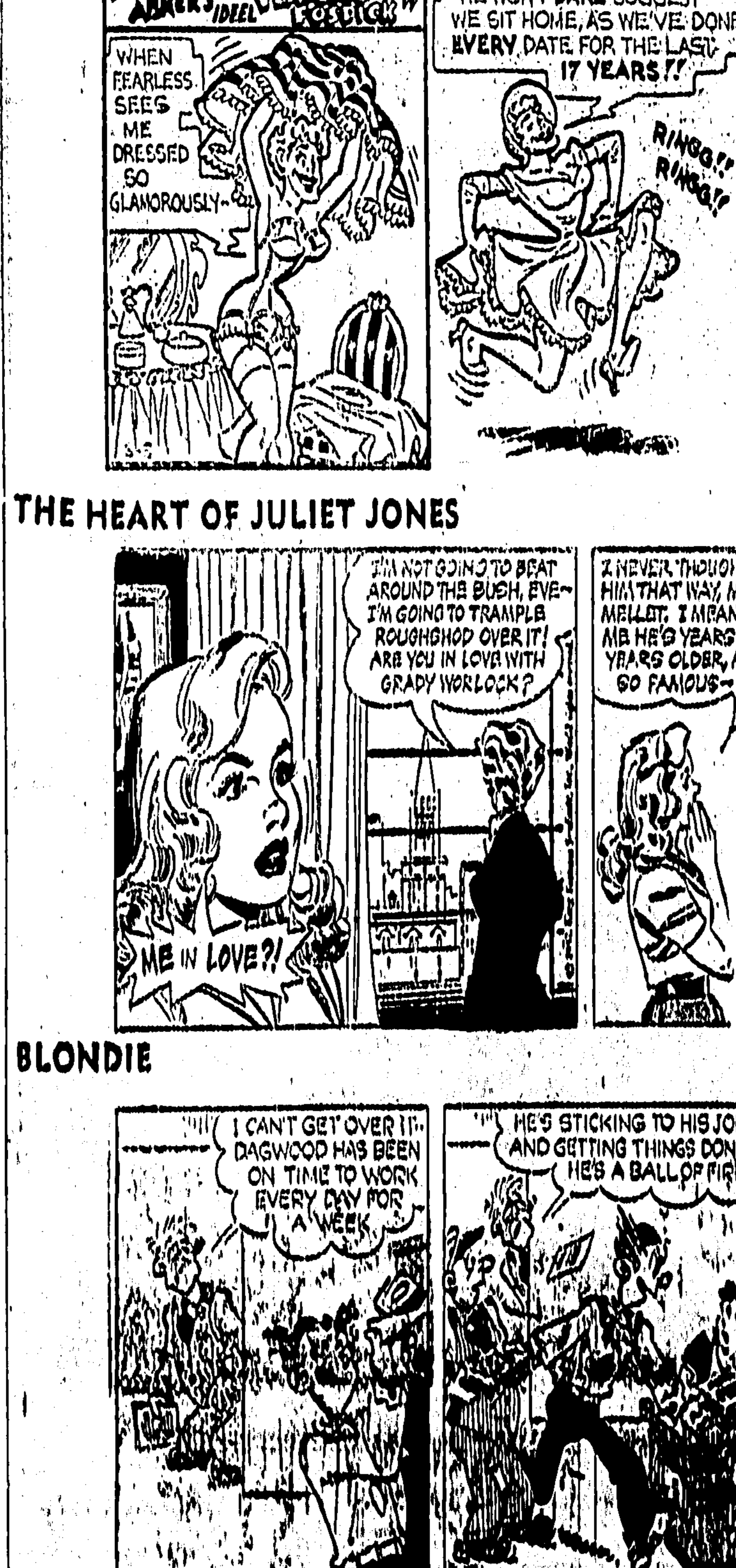
