Hiring of Engineer Again Under Study

Complaining of the badly broken "black-top" surfacing of Prince Rupert roads, Alderman S. J. Dominato told city council last night the city should appoint a qualified engineer at an annual salary of \$8,000.

Ald. Norman Bellis, chairman of the Board of Works, agreed that surface conditions were poor in some cases, but said the problem was common to many B.C. municipalities.

He added that the situation had been just as bad when the city employed a qualified engineer.

Commenting that qualified engineers "just weren't being bad," Ald. Donald Ritchie expressed the view that there would be no applications for the job "even if we offered \$12,000 a year."

Council recommended the Board of Works to consider the possibility of employing a qualified engineer.

Prince Rupert property owners can now legally culvert and fill ditches fronting their land to gain access to it.

This was confirmed last night when the city council approved the Board of Works recommendation that:

"Individual property owners shall be allowed to culvert and fill ditches fronting their properties to provide access to the properties, upon obtaining prior permission in writing from the Superintendent of Works, provided also that the city will agree to provide such culvert and crossing at a length of 16 feet at a flat fee of \$25 per crossing."
