B.C. FULL OF DEER, MOOSE, FISH AND GAME, CLUBS TOLD

PENTICTON (P—Almost every area of British Columbia is overpopulated with deer and moose, the province's chief game biologist Dr. James Hatter said Friday.

He told the annual convention of the B.C. Federation of fish and game clubs that because most areas are above average carrying capacity for deer and moose, heavy winter losses can be expected if weather conditions are unfavorable to survival of the animals.

Dr. Hatter said the only way to prevent winter losses is to keep the surplus number of animals as low as possible.
