CAPE CANAVERAL, States Army launched another Explorer satellite today and 12 minutes later the new baby moon apparently was in a successful orbit.

Crusted white with frost on the city surface of its liquid oxygen tanks, the 70-foot Jupiter-C rocket blasted off at 9:38 a.m.

The missile rose straight and sure and climbed swiftly toward an overcast sky.
