

# Hotelmen Nick G & A In 11 Innings

## Cameron, Sedgwick Heroes of Thriller; Esquires Split, Hand Terrace First Loss

Cameron belted a home run, a game-tying double and batted in three runs as his contribution while Sedgwick pulled off a bunt in the bottom of the 11th inning to break a game tied 4-4 since the bottom of the ninth.

### DULL GAME TO 9th

Up until the bottom of the ninth it had been a listless uninteresting game highlighted only by G & A's Len Shankel's pitching and Gordie Cameron's circuit blow over the right field fence with none on. Shankel had a two-hitter going while Cameron had been tagged for eight safeties.

Gordon and Anderson, according to the scoreboard, had the game in the bag. They had scored twice in the first on a walk, a double by Bill Sunberg, another walk, a passed ball, an error and a single by Kilpatrick. They tallied again in the second on Sunberg's single and Kilpatrick's double. Cameron settled down and held the hard-waremen scoreless for the next three innings.

With one out Marshall got a walk, went to second on a passed ball. Bill Yerema singled and went to second on the throw in. Gordie Cameron belted a double that cleared the bases and made it a new ball-game.

The tenth inning was a four-up and three-down affair for both teams.

The top of the 11th contained little drama but provided quite a bit of humor for all. It marked the inauspicious debut of former Hotel and Commercial manager Miner Simundson in the uniform of Gordon and Anderson, once his sworn foe. Darrell Young was sent in to pinch-hit for Bill Morrison and drew Dahl walked, went to second on a

Marshall singled to open the bottom of the 11th and went to second while Ian Dunbar juggled the ball out in centerfield. Yerema's sacrifice bunt put Marshall on third and Raisins Sedgwick put the game on ice for the Hotelmen by bunting out a safe hit which allowed Marshall to score.

In winning Cameron struck out 13, walked five. Hotelmen left seven men stranded on the bases. Shankel fanned five and

walked seven. G & A left 10 men on the bases.

### ESQUIRES SPLIT

Meanwhile at Terrace yesterday Esquires gained a split with the champion Loggers. In the first half of a double-header Terrace clobbered Esquires 23-0 and in the seven inning affair Esquires edged the Loggers 6-5 to hand the interior squad its first loss. 
## Ploen Signs With Bombers

WINNIPEG (CP)—Quarterback Kenny Ploen, 22, of the University of Iowa has signed with Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Western Interprovincial Football Union. Bomber officials announced today. Contract terms were not released.


# Nickel industry increases production capacity another 50%



Paced by Inco's new developments in Manitoba, producers put 1961 Free World nickel output at 650-675 million pounds a year—up 130% over 1951
