**City-Born Woman Heads  
Nursing School Project**

OTTAWA — Helen K. Mussallem of Vancouver is to head a pilot project to evaluate Canadian Nursing Schools, the Canadian Nurses Association announced Monday.

Miss Mussallem, who was born in Prince Rupert, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Solomon Mussallem now of Haney, B.C., is a cousin of Jack Mussallem of this city.

She is now associate director of nursing education at Vancouver General Hospital school of nursing, and begins her new job in September.

The CNA last summer voted \$10,000 to launch the pilot project in an attempt to evaluate and raise standards of nursing education.

CNA officials said 25 of 98 schools which volunteered to take part in the project will be visited by nine regional evaluators directed by Miss Mussallem.
