In every bid you make at bridge you are measuring the probable loss, if things go wrong, against the probable gain, j they go right. When you double your opponents into a game, obviously the loss is considerable. You must be sure of your ground, then, when you double a contract or two in a major or three in a minor.

BUT WHEN you double a bid of two clubs or two diamonds, ' your loss is not so much even if things go wrong. You can take a much bigger chance in this situation because you have a shot at a substantial gain at the risk of only a small loss.


BERLIN (Reuters) — More; workers promising to do more, work, and more speeches pledging full Russian support, seemed.

The Soviet delegation has split into two parts, with Com-i munist party chief Nikita Khrushehev heading one and Trade Minister Anastas Mikoyan leading the other.

If Friday's activities are any guide, the visit—now in its fourth day—will be marked with further promises of harder work, children presenting the Russians with flowers, and speeches assuring East Germany of the full* support of the Soviet Union in building communism—or in the case of "any emergency."
