

WA's Called on To Aid God's Work, Group Told

Members of the Women's auxiliaries of the Anglican Church of Canada attending the Caledonia Diocesan Board's 45th annual meeting in the Jubilee year were told yesterday morning that they were called upon to assist God's forces in the challenge that confronts the world.

Archdeacon C. A. Hincliffe of Smithers in opening the first of the two-day conclave said that the auxiliaries had come a long way in playing their part in the work of the Lord and the Church, since the election of the first president of the Diocesan Board of the WA on August 7, 1907.

Speaking on his text "Whom Shall I Send and Who Will Go With Us" Archdeacon Hincliffe said that the WA is a helping force, that can be called upon to help the army of God, not only with financial support but with spiritual assistance in winning souls for Him.

"Today God is speaking to each and every member of the Church to unite efforts to combat the forces that are threatening our life today.
