Changes provide that: 1. A five-yard penalty will be handed out when a player who

is offside comes in contact with an opponent and returns onside-before the ball is put in play.

2. The stripe marking the closest point to the sidelines where the ball can be scrimmaged will be moved out 20 yards, instead of 15, from each sideline. The move would give teams more running room along the touchlines.

3. The position names in the CRU rule book will be revised to take on the "more up-to-date" form of centre, guard, tackle and end instead of snap, inside wing, middle wing and out-


