Grain Exports Third Highest

Barley Shipments Form 90 Per Cent

Prince Rupert in 1957 enjoyed its third best year for grain shipments in the past six years, figures provided by the Canadian government elevator showed today.

A total of 181,209 long tons of grain, with only 1,002 tons being wheat and the remainder No. 1 and No. 2 feed barley, was shipped out of this port last year. By contrast a total of 307,800 tons of grain were exported from here in 1953 and 234,152 long tons of grain were shipped out di Prince Rupert in 1952. In 1953 there were 236,225 long tons of wheat exported from here along with 71,575 tons of barley. The previous year 189,575 tons of barley was shipped compared to 44,577 tons of wheat.

At the same time, Capt. W. H. Koughan, Prince Rupert harbormaster said today, that the barlcy shipment constituted 90 per cent of the city's exports. He said that out of 26 deepsea

90 DAYS, \$90 FINE SENTENCE FOR SLAYING OF KOREAN GIRL

KUNSAN, Korea (A) -- Airman Edward L. Young of the United States Air Force was sentenced today to three months at hard labor and a fine of \$90 for the fatal shooting of a Korean girl at a bomb dump he was guarding.

The 20-year-old airman was convicted of assault with a dangerous weapon by the air force general court-martial, Another airman on guard with Young at the time, Caroll D. Taylor, was convicted December 11 of assault with a dangerous weapon and sentenced to alno month in prison.

Young and Taylor were guarding the bomb dump last September when three Korean girls entered and began cutting grass for fuel. Two of the girls said Young indicated they could onter the dump, but Young denied it.

At \$200,000 VANCOUVER (P) - Damage estimated at \$200,000 was caused Wednesday night by a fire in a waterfront grain elevator which for a time threatened vessels
