

Ald. Krueger Named To Board for Centre Rent Arbitration

Alderman Michael Krueger last night accepted the appointment to an arbitration board to represent the city in a dispute between the Civic Centre and City Council over increased rent for the Prince Rupert General Library.

Letter from the Civic Centre by Library Board chairman A. Ronald Ritchie suggested the city pay it back rent \$50 since the council had created an extra \$50 in its budget for library rent. Rent for the library was \$50 until the City Centre board of directors was appointed acting city clerk in the absence of Clerk-Comptroller R. W. Long.

Miss Audrey Wrathall was authorized to sign cheques in the absence of city collector Peter Lien. Mrs. Charles Pearce was appointed acting city clerk in the absence of Clerk-Comptroller R. W. Long.

On a motion of Alderman Kay Smith, chairman of the health committee, council approved the removal of a shack on Fraser Street within 60 days. The action also gave Building Inspector J. C. Ewart the right to pull down the building, the lumber to be auctioned off and the money derived used to defray city expenditures in the removal of the shack.

Referred to the appropriate committee for study was a motion by Ald. Youngs that in future all new buildings in the downtown section of the city to be constructed in the future be of masonry construction. "It is time we stopped worrying so much about the older buildings and concentrated on the new ones," he said.

Changes suggested by the contractor and accepted by the building inspector had cleared the way for renovation of the C. G. Ham blocked, which was damaged by fire.

On recommendation of the Utilities committee headed by Ald. Youngs, council approved the purchase of a panel truck from Rupert Motors at a cost of \$2,347.43, which was the lowest tender submitted. Alderman A. Donald Ritchie refrained from voting.

Council approved a recommendation of the finance committee, chairman Alderman Michael Krueger, that Barbara Bond be notified that the city did not wish to sell the small island off Digby Island where the old isolation hospital is situated. In

answer to a query Ald. Krueger said that the city wished to retain the island in the event that need for another isolation hospital ever arose.

Council, sitting as a board of health last night endorsed a recommendation of Sanitary Inspector R. G. Scott that a shack on Water Street be considered unfit for human habitation and that the occupants be given 30 days to vacate. Alderman Smith, chairman of the Health committee, said that Mr. Smith had found that the building had no toilet facilities, the number of occupants was too great for its size and that the building presented a nuisance and danger to health. She said that the owner had considered renovating the place but changed his mind and given the occupants notice to leave. Even if the building is sold, she said, the sanitary inspector had condemned it as human habitation.

Trade licence applications approved by council included: T. McMullin, 424 Seventh Avenue East, renting suites; Moyra Delany, 83 Borden Street, tailor; Karl Peltonia, 517 Sixth Avenue West, building contractor; Ronald J. Basso, 315 Ninth Avenue West, delivery service; N. G. Nelson, 1106 Eleventh Avenue East, building contractor; Borgild Knutson, McBride and Third Avenue, news stand and gasoline pump.

Dr. Morris Wayman will be the Centre representative. A nominee is expected to be appointed by the Library board.

Resolution from the Lower Inland Park Advisory committee asking city council to support its move for keeping the park commissioners instead of them being appointed laid down in the new Municipal Act was referred to the health committee which will study the resolution and present it at the annual meeting of the city of B.C. Municipalities.

Alderman T. Norton Youngs and council passed a motion that council advise the Greater Vancouver Tourist association that Prince Rupert had the interest in Greater Vancouver's problem concerning the new municipal Act referring to shops and regulations. Later council moved in respect to Prince Rupert Clerk-Comptroller R. W. Long seek legal advice from the city solicitor as to how it affected local stores and shops.

Mayor George E. Hills said that he would be available when members of the Pacific Coast Travel Writers association, one of the cruise ships, call in Prince Rupert. He agreed to come them on the suggestion Ald. Youngs that if the Chamber of Commerce and city cooperated in extending a welcome and hospitality it might gain the city a measure of publicity.

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
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

More Than \$500,000 Spent by IODE Groups

VANCOUVER (CP)— More than \$500,000 was spent by chapters of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire on service work in Canada and overseas, Mrs. R. C. Latimer of Toronto reported to the annual meeting of the IODE here today.

A total of 23½ tons of clothing valued at \$83,375 was shipped overseas last year, the national services secretary declared.

"This year all aspects of service work show a steady increase and the IODE is so well-gear'd for action that when an emergency situation arises, chapters are able to respond without delay and with efficiency," Mrs. Latimer said.

When Hungarian refugees began arriving in Canada personal comfort bags were distributed by IODE members. Also 10,000 of these bags were shipped to Austria during the emergency.

WIDE SERVICES

IODE members spent a total of 113,027 hours at all types of clinics, libraries, hospitals and services for blind and elderly people.

Chapters in Alberta and Saskatchewan operated craft shops where veterans' work is displayed and sold. Manitoba and Ontario furnished children's playrooms in hospitals. She reported that a total of \$82,769 was spent under institutional service.

New and used clothing was supplied to Canadians in need. Food has been distributed for the relief of hunger and poverty, she said.

A total of \$21,250 was spent on recreational purposes. Chapters held classes for underprivileged children, camps for underprivileged girls, annual picnics and parties for orphanage youngsters.

Close to \$10,000 was voted to other organizations from IODE funds, Mrs. Latimer said. She added that IODE members raised another \$93,450 for welfare agencies.

FOSTER KNOWLEDGE

In her report on empire and world affairs, convener Mrs. Harry J. Brooke of Toronto appealed to members "to learn to know and understand the world outside the Commonwealth, to gain an understanding that will help combat communism in Europe and Asia."

National film convener Mrs. James R. Wright of Toronto said chapters are continuing to support the national IODE film fund. She regretted that "there is a dearth of films of a patriotic nature."

Mrs. G. Graham Simlar of Toronto, in her report on national civil defence, urged members to learn to do everything they can to protect their own life and the lives of their family. "The apathy of the public is still our worst enemy," she urged delegates to offer their services to their local civil defence organizations.

Fourteen New Chapters Of IODE Formed in 1957

VANCOUVER (CP) — Fourteen new chapters formed in 1956 bring the current total to 977, members of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire were told at the opening session yesterday of their annual meeting.

Mrs. G. D. Leggett of Toronto, national organizing secretary, noted that this actually is a net increase of six chapters, because in the same period seven senior and one junior chapter disbanded. Total membership now is 31,403.

More than 500 introduction cards had been sent out about members moving from one province to another during the year, she said. She also disclosed that total membership of the IODE on the island of Bermuda is 354, including 16 new members.

FACES DEFICIT

Despite all efforts to curtail expenses, Mrs. P. M. L. Robinson, national treasurer, also of Toronto, reported a deficit of \$1,060 in the general operating fund. "The finance committee has again budgeted for a deficit for 1957 due to the continual increase in expense," she added.

Suggesting that the raising of fees be considered, Mrs. Robinson said "an organization as large as the IODE should not repeatedly show greater expenditures than revenues."

Eleven primary chapters have come under the national committee in Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island and the Yukon Territory, said national secretary Mrs. D. W. McGibbon, Toronto. She added that these chapters work not only for IO
