



JAPANESE PICK U.S. GOLFERS TO WIN CANADA CUP TOURNEY

TOKYO (19) — Japanese sans have established the United States team of Sam Snead and Jimmy Demaret as outstanding favorites in the Canada Cup matches, which start Thursday, but most observers figure it will be a tossup among at least six of the international golf teams. There was almost a riot today when Snead and Demaret played at a neighboring Tokyo Club, disappointing hundreds who had gathered at the Kasumigaseki Country Club to see them in action.

But saner heads have figured there are at least a halfdozen tandems among the 30 from throughout the world capable of seizing the top prize.

Outstanding among these are the Australian team of Peter Thomson and Bruce Crampton, both young yet experienced golfers who have a brilliant international reputation. Thomson, who won three British Opens in a row, is rated one of the great golfers of the world.
