East-West Parley Allied Chiefs OK U.S. Arms Offer

PARIS (CP)—The 15power NATO alliance called today for a foreign ministers' meeting with Russia to resolve the East-West deadlock on disarmament negotiations.

At the same time the chiefs of the Allied Western governments, in a communique issued at the end of their first summit conference, announced their decision to arm Western Europe with American-made missiles, and stockpile nuclear warheads there for use in case of war.

"Soviet leaders have made it clear that the most modern and destructive weapons of all kinds; are being introduced as a means of warfare," the communique

"We are therefore resolved to achieve the most effective pattern of NATO military strength,
