BLACKWOOD on BRIDGE

Playing Deception Against Declarer Defender Must Try To Force Play

Often the declarer will have two or more ways to play a hand to make his contract. Naturally, the defender's job is to try to entice him into selecting the line of play which will lose. Mr. Masters made a beautiful deceptive play to accomplish that result in today's deal.

Against Miss Brash's aggressive three no trump contract Mr. Abel led the nine of hearts. Mr. Masters ducked, playing the seven spot and Miss Brash won with a jack.

She saw that she had two heart winners, three and possibly four diamonds and two top clubs. At best she was going to have to develop one or two additional tricks in the black suits. She decided to go after spades because she was solid in that suit outside of the ace and queen and, if the club situation was favorable, she could bring in three or four tricks in that suit without losing the lead.

At trick two, then, she led the ten of spades and ducked in dummy. Now Mr. Masters was good enough to realize that if he won this trick with the queen, his normal action, he would probably force Miss Brash into the line of play which would give her nine tricks.

Holding three small clubs, he knew that suit would break favorably and, on the bidding, Miss Brash almost surely had the king or queen-ten in the suit. If she held both king and queen, there was probably no way to beat the hand anyway.

If he won the first spade trick with the queen and cleared the heart suit, Miss Brash would have to forget about spades. She would know Mr. Masters held the ace by reason of his opening bid.

find that the queen was right and the opposing clubs divided 3-3.

On this reasoning Mr. Masters knew he had to keep Miss Brash coming in spades. He won the second trick with the ace of spades, cashed the ace of hearts and followed with the queen of clubs.

Miss Brash took the king of hearts and can hardly be blamed for running the nine of spades through and losing to the queen, a card which Mr. Masters "couldn't have."


