

Subsidized low rental housing, which takes into account the income of a family and how great the family's need is for such housing, is working successfully in Vancouver, J. E. Brown, deputy Minister of Municipal Affairs told City Council last night. Mr. Brown, who happened to

be in this neighborhood when housing was in the news, explained there was a "different philosophy" between low rental economic housing and subsidized housing. "Economic housing only increases the stock of houses," Mr. Brown said. "Subsidized housing determines how many need the accommodation and if they can afford it.
